

# H. M. HATHAWAY, 66, SCHOOL ARCHITECT

Designer of Many Well-Known  
Educational Buildings Dies  
in Montclair, N. J., Home

MONTCLAIR, N. J., Nov. 6—Herbert M. Hathaway, well known school architect associated with the firm of Starrett & Van Vleck, in New York, died last night at his home, 149 North Mountain Avenue, after a brief illness. His age was 66.

Born in Herndon, Va., Mr. Hathaway was graduated from Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1902. He then became associated with the architectural firm of Gilbert & Bettle in Newark. In 1914 he joined Starrett & Van Vleck.

Mr. Hathaway designed practically all of Montclair's public school buildings, including Montclair High School and the Woodman Field Stadium. He was also architect for the Bloomfield Junior High School, Caldwell High School, Horace Mann School in New York, the Isaac E. Young High School in New Rochelle, Lincoln School of Teachers College, Columbia University; Dodge Hall of Columbia, the Garden City Central and elementary schools and many others.

Active in civic affairs here, Mr. Hathaway served from 1933 to 1939 as a member of the Montclair Planning Board and was a member of a special committee which rewrote and modernized the Montclair Building Code several years ago. He had been a resident of Montclair since 1929.

He leaves a widow, Mrs. Hershey Hathaway; three daughters, Mrs. Robert J. Watson and Mrs. Ernest H. Olliver Jr. of Montclair and Mrs. Robert E. Crockett of Woodside, L. I., and three sisters, Miss Mabel Hathaway of New Bedford, Mass., and the Misses Bertha and Isabelle Hathaway of New Rochelle.

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
